Financial Intelligence Unit-India (FIU-IND) imposes penalty of Rs. 5,49,00,000 on Paytm Payments Bank Ltd with reference to violations of its obligations under PMLA

The Financial Intelligence Unit-India (FIU-IND), in furtherance of the powers conferred upon the Director FIU-IND under Section 13(2)(d) of the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA), 2002, has imposed a monetary penalty of Rs. 5,49,00,000 (rupees five crore forty nine lakh) on Paytm Payments Bank Ltd with reference to the violations of its obligations under the PMLA read with the Prevention of Money Laundering (Maintenance of Records) Rules, 2005 (PML Rules) issued thereunder and applicable guidelines and advisories issued by the Director FIU-IND.

FIU-IND initiated a review of the Paytm Payments Bank Ltd on receipt of specific information from law enforcement agencies in respect of few entities and their network of businesses engaged in a number of illegal acts, including organising and facilitating online gambling. Further, the money generated from these illegal operations, i.e. proceeds of crime were routed and channelled through bank accounts maintained by these entities with the Paytm Payments Bank Ltd.

In furtherance of the above and upon scrutiny of the documents on record, FIU IND issued a compliance Show Cause Notice to the bank for its violations of (i)


Who are star campaigners?

- Political party leaders designated as "star campaigners" under Section 77 of the Representation of the People Act, 1951, deliver speeches during significant political rallies.
- A recognised political party can have 40 star campaigners and an unrecognised (but registered) political party can have 20.
- The expenditure incurred on campaigning by such notified star campaigners is exempt from being added to the election expenditure of a candidate.

India to see warmer start to summer this year: IMD

The country is likely to record above-normal rainfall in March (more than 117% of the long-period average of 29.9 mm).

 India is likely to experience a warmer start to the summer season this year with El Nino_conditions predicted to continue through the season, the India Meteorological Department (IMD) said.

El Niño

- El Niño is the warming of seawater in the central-east Equatorial Pacific that occurs every few years.
- During El Niño, surface temperatures in the equatorial
 Pacific rise, and trade winds east-west winds that
 blow near the Equator weaken.
- El Niño causes dry, warm winters in the Northern U.S. and Canada and increases the risk of flooding in the U.S. gulf coast and southeastern U.S. It also brings drought to Indonesia and Australia.
- In India, it causes weak rainfall and more heat.

• At least nine people were injured after an explosion at the Rameshwaram café in Bengaluru's Whitefield area on possibly by an improvised explosive device (IED).


What are IEDs?

- An IED is basically a home-made bomb.
- IEDs can come in many forms, ranging from a small pipe bomb to a sophisticated device capable of causing massive damage and loss of life.
- Components of an IED: These include an initiator or a triggering mechanism, a switch (which arms the explosive), a main charge (which causes the explosion), a power source and a container.
- IEDs may be packed with additional materials or "enhancements" such as nails, glass, or metal fragments designed to increase the amount of shrapnel released by the explosion.

Express View on semiconductors: Betting big

On semiconductors, the government takes an important step forward. A stable and enabling policy environment will be needed





News

 The government approved proposals to set up three semiconductor units in **Gujarat and Assam** with an estimated investment of **Rs 1.26 lakh crore**.

About

- The project include India's first semiconductor fabrication plant to be set up in Dholera, Gujarat, by the Tata Group.
- Most modern-day semiconductors are integrated circuits, also referred to as 'chips'.
- The chip comprising interconnections of transistors, diodes, capacitors and resistors, layered on a wafer sheet of silicon.
- About 70% of the current global manufacturing capacity of semiconductors is confined to South Korea, Taiwan and China, with the US and Japan making up for much of the rest.
