- Across the **Nile lies the Theban Necropolis**, full of ancient tombs and temples.




Crucial Facts

- Legislature: National Assembly
- **Border:** Namibia (S), Zambia (E), Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) (N&NE), Republic of the Congo (NW).





Key Highlights



- It is the **second-largest Portuguese-speaking country** after Brazil in area and population.
- Independence was achieved in 1975 after an anti-colonial struggle (1961–1974).
- Climate varies significantly between regions: coastal, inland plateau, and southern desert areas.
- The economy is heavily **dependent on oil**, which accounts for over 90% of exports.

- Coastline: Arabian Sea (SE), Gulf of Oman (NE)





Key Highlights



- It is the oldest continuously independent state in the Arab world, ruled by the Al Bu Said dynasty since 1744.
- Historically, Oman was a powerful maritime empire, with influence extending to Iran, Pakistan, and Zanzibar during the 19th century.
- Apart from oil, Oman's economy includes tourism, and the trade of fish, dates, and other agricultural products.
