Demands for Grants

Why in News?

 Lok Sabha passes Demands for Grants 2025–26, approving ₹50 lakh crore in government expenditure.

What is a Demand for Grant?

- Proposal for expenditure from the Consolidated Fund of India.
- Presented to Lok Sabha as part of the Annual Financial Statement.
- Governed by Article 113 of the Constitution.

Contents of Demand for Grants

- Revenue Expenditure
- Capital Expenditure
- Grants to States/UTs
- Loans & Advances

Who Presents It?

- Each ministry or department presents its own Demand for Grants.
- Large ministries (e.g., Defence, Railways) may have multiple demands.

Parliamentary Process

- Lok Sabha: Can approve, reduce, or reject the demands.
- Rajya Sabha: No voting rights on these demands.
- Requires prior approval of the President before presentation.








National Board for Wildlife (NBWL)

Why in News?

• The 7th meeting of the National Board for Wildlife (NBWL) was chaired by the Prime Minister at Gir National Park, Gujarat.

Key Announcements

- Dolphin Census: 6,327 riverine dolphins recorded in 8 states; UP leads the count.
- Lion Conservation: 16th population estimate in 2025; Barda Sanctuary to support lion dispersal.
- Cheetah Project: Expansion to Gandhisagar (MP) and Banni Grasslands (Gujarat).
- Wildlife Health Centre: New referral centre in Junagadh for disease management.
- Tech Use: Geospatial mapping and AI to tackle forest fires and human-wildlife conflict.
- Gharial Conservation: Focus on reviving declining populations.
- Great Indian Bustard: National plan for its protection and recovery.
- Tiger Conservation: Efforts to extend protection beyond reserves.







Kurd Issue

Why in News?

• The Kurdistan Workers' Party (PKK) announced an immediate ceasefire, aiming to end its 40-year insurgency.

About Kurd

- Kurds: Ethnic group of 40 million people, mainly in Iran, Iraq, Syria, and Turkey.
- Language: Kurds speak various dialects, unrelated to Turkish or Arabic, mostly practicing Sunni Islam.
- Syria: Kurdish-led Syrian Democratic Forces (SDF) control northeastern Syria, with significant political influence.
- Concerns: Kurds were promised a nation post-WWI, but their aspirations were never fully realized.
- Suppression: They faced rebellion and suppression of their language, culture, and identity by states.
- Insurgency: PKK launched an armed insurgency in the 1980s, seeking independence for the Kurds.
